Sustainable Forestry Policy Graphic Packaging International

Graphic Packaging International is committed to the goals of sustainable forestry and promoting responsible resource management and use. To achieve these goals, the Company seeks to continually achieve certification to the Sustainable Forestry Initiative[®] (SFI[®]) Chain of Custody and Certified Fiber Sourcing requirements, the Program for the Endorsement of Forest Certification (PEFC) Chain of Custody Standard and Logo Usage Rules and the Forest Stewardship Council[®] Chain of Custody and Trademark Use Standards.

Graphic Packaging International is committed to sourcing paperboard material from certified chain of custody and non-controversial sources. Company's Sustainable Forestry Policy is to promote the principles of sustainable forestry and development. Graphic Packaging International strives to source forest-based raw material from sustainably managed, certified chain of custody and non-controversial sources.

This includes a commitment to avoid the following unacceptable sources, as defined by FSC, and controversial sources, as defined by PEFC and SFI.

Unacceptable sources, as defined by FSC:

- Illegal logging or the trade in illegal wood or forest products.
- Violation of traditional and human rights in forestry operations.
- Destruction of high conservation values in forestry operations.
- Significant conversion of forests to plantations or non-forest use.
- Introduction of genetically modified organisms in forestry operations.

Controversial sources, as defined by SFI and PEFC:

- Forest activities which are not in compliance with applicable state, provincial, federal, or international laws.
- Forest activities which are contributing to regional declines in habitat conservation and species protection (including biodiversity and special sites, Alliance for Zero Extinction sites and key Biodiversity Areas, threatened and endangered species).
- Conversion sources originating from regions experiencing forest area decline.
- Forest activities where the spirit of the ILO Declaration on Fundamental Principles and Rights at work (1998) are not met.
- Forest activities where the spirit of the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (2007) are not met.
- Fiber sourced from areas without effective social laws
- Illegal Logging including trade in CITES (The Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora) listed species.
- Conflict Timber.
- Genetically modified trees via forest tree biotechnology.

To help implement and achieve the above sustainability, recycling and biodegradable objectives, Graphic Packaging International has developed and adopted appropriate programs and documented procedures to guide its paperboard procurement, production of printed packaging products and associated sustainable forestry claims and labels.

Graphic Packaging International is also committed to annually review the effectiveness of its forest sustainability policy, chain of custody and responsible fiber sourcing programs to continually improve it management systems and environmental performance.
